The purpose of summer reading assignment is complex:

- •To help build confidence and competence as readers of complex texts;
- •To give you, when you enter the class in the fall, an immediate basis for discussion of literature- elements like theme, narrative, viewpoint, symbolism, plot structure, etc.;
- •To set up a basis for comparison with other works we will read during the year;
- •To provide you with the beginnings of a repertoire of works you can write about on the AP Lit exam next spring.
- •To prepare for analyzing and writing poetry essays.

<u>Summer Reading - Novel Assignment & Poetry Assignment</u>

- Frankenstein by Mary Shelley
- •Assigned chapters from *How to Read Literature Like a Professor* by Thomas Foster.
- •Two assigned poems (see directions)
- How to Read a Poem"

I. Novel Assignment

- Before you read Frankenstein: Read Chapter 21 from Foster's book paying attention to what he says about Frankenstein.
- After you read Frankenstein: Apply the following chapters from Foster's book to Frankenstein.
 - ◆ Chapter 1— "Every Trip Is a Quest"
 - ♦ Chapter 7— "...or The Bible"
 - ◆ Chapter 9 "It's Greek to Me" (think Prometheus)
 - ◆ Chapter 10— "It's More Than Just Rain or Snow"
 - ♦ Chapter 11— "...More Than It's Gonna Hurt You: Concerning Violence"
 - ♦ Chapter 12— "Is That a Symbol?"
 - ◆ Chapter 19— "Geography Matters..."
 - ♦ Chapter 20— "...So Does Season"
 - ♦ Chapter 25— "Don't Read with Your Eyes"
- •Respond to each chapter by writing a well-developed paragraph that explains the main points Foster is making and show how they apply to Mary Shelley's *Frankenstein* (150 word minimum).
