Chicken Big! by Keith Graves

I Don't Want to Be a Frog by Dev Petty

Children Make Terrible Pets by Peter Brown

When Lucy, a young bear, discovers a boy in the woods, she's absolutely delighted. Through a series of hilarious and surprising scenes, the bear becomes convinced that children really do make terrible pets.

A great interactive picture book that adds a nice spin to the traditional fairy tales involving wolves.

Q is for Duck by Mary Elting and Michael Folsom
